ArtsLink NB was founded in 2009 to advance the arts in New Brunswick by linking and unifying artists and arts organizations and promoting their value. **We represent artists of all disciplines, from all parts of New Brunswick.**

- Give artists the tools and training they need to succeed in New Brunswick and beyond.

MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

Welcome! It's been a year of success and expansion at ArtsLink and we're happy to share that with our membership and the community at large. I have almost daily contact with this vibrant organization and the constituents who make up its membership and stakeholder group. That contact is a source of hope and inspiration in the midst of troubled times.

Some theorize that social media is the great homogenizer: streaming, assimilating, and narrowing our experience by an algorithmic definition based on our "likes," our "views," and the online community that we connect to; that our worldview is, in fact, shrinking by dint of our digital proximity to those who share our outlook and interests.

What better spot to celebrate the 10th anniversary of ArtsLink NB, founded in 2009?

I'd like to acknowledge two board members who are taking their leave: Mike Wennberg is a founding member of ArtsLink NB. He was instrumental in shaping the foundation that has brought us to this milestone. We can also thank Mike for bringing Kathy Hamer to ArtsLink. Her determination and vitality have brought focus to the evolution of ArtsLink. Mike and Kathy will be greatly missed on our board. We wish them well in their next adventure.

This organization thrives on the generous support of the Province of New Brunswick, the Canada Council, the Sheila Hugh Mackay Foundation, and the many colleagues who partner with us. MESSAGE FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

This has been another remarkable year for ArtsLink NB. ArtsLink has increased its programming, hired a full-time communications manager and brought on a dedicated program coordinator for our Arts Education research and pilot projects. These additions have been essential in delivering our mandate and serving our members and the needs of the arts sector. Continued collaboration with arts organizations has led to the development of strong research, new initiatives, and effective messaging.

ArtsLink's annual programming has increased exponentially. Building on our compelling panel discussions, the Start to Finish Workshop Series, the Short & Sweet Speaker Series, and the CATAPULT Arts Accelerator, we have developed several new programs. We've created an Arts Writing Intensive program led by editorial staff from *Canadian Art Magazine*, and a Cross-Cultural Creation Residency in collaboration with Mawi'art and AAAPNB. We have also ventured into improving arts education in the Anglophone School districts through our report *Creating a Common Vision*, which we followed with a series of pilot programs to increase awareness and access to beneficial art programming for students from Kindergarten to grade 12.

All of our activities and efforts this year have been possible through the immense strength of our small yet determined staff, volunteer hours from our board, and the participation of our membership. I am very grateful to be working with such a caring and capable team, and with the commitment of Teagan Keith, Kenzie Hancox, Jericho Knopp, and Mark Burnett, ArtsLink is poised to see another banner year in 2019-20.

This year marks ArtsLink's 10th anniversary, and without the vision of past board members and executive directors as well as the support from our membership and the arts community, ArtsLink would not be where it is today. ArtsLink will continue its positive momentum and respond to the needs of the arts sector.

I joined the ArtsLink team in the fall of 2014 and was lucky enough to benefit from the mentorship and care of former EDs Kate Wallace and Gillian Dykeman. 

MEMBERSHIP

ArtsLink NB continued to attract new members over the last year. The majority of our members are individual artists, but the number of arts organizations, arts-based businesses, and supporters has increased yearly. Membership numbers jumped by 61% this year.

We have increased our online toolkits and publications, communications with the membership, and added to our lending library which provides free equipment loans to members.

One of ArtsLink's main priorities is to increase our value and services to our members. We are active listeners and do what we can to enhance their socio-economic status in New Brunswick.

ArtsLink NB reached 335 active members this year. Its membership is made up of artists of all disciplines and all regions of the province.

SHORT & SWEET SPEAKER SERIES

ArtsLink's Short & Sweet Speaker Series takes place every summer and offers an opportunity for artists of all disciplines to present themselves and their work through a Short & Sweet presentation: 20 slides, 20 seconds - no tech slip ups, no pressure.

This series is an informal twist on a stiff business event and the goal is to bring folks together to find out what their peers are up to, and bust everyone out of their studios to share stories and meet new fans.

This year's events took place in St. Andrews, Fredericton, and Bathurst and featured Tyler Nagle, Jared Peters, Kelly Hill, Ysabelle Vautour, Cat LeBlanc, Candice Ostroski, Janine Daigle, Samuel Daigle, Mahmoud Abdelkader, Daniel Eastman, Debra Usher, and Lynn Bowland.

LENDING LIBRARY

ArtsLink maintains a lending library to enhance our workshop series and to help our members document their work. Members can borrow equipment including cameras, microphones, lights, and stands, for up to a two-week period for free. They also have access to our documentation handbook which helps enhance their ability to successfully produce high quality documentation of their own work.







HUMAN RESOURCES

ArtsLink NB just keeps growing. To fulfill our mandate, it is essential to increase our capacity by developing a dynamic team to deliver our programs and serve our membership. This year, ArtsLink has created new positions and brought on some bright and energetic new team members.

In 2018-19, thanks to Canada Summer Jobs and the Future Ready NB program, we were able to hire two very capable students to manage our summer programming as well as a dedicated intern from UNB Fredericton to assist with our Arts Education projects. These workforce programs are essential to ArtsLink's growth and stability.

Patrick Phinney is studying communications at the University of New Brunswick Saint John and was back for his second summer with ArtsLink. As our summer events coordinator, he organized our Short & Sweet Speaker Series which took place in Bathurst, Fredericton and St. Andrews. His position involved organizing every detail of the event, from the venues and artists, all the way down to the marketing and development of promotional material.

Serenna Chapman studies arts and education at the University of New Brunswick. She has a background in music and currently plays with local band The Backstays. She also teaches music lessons at Long & McQuade. This summer, she was ArtsLink's marketing assistant, interviewing artists for our summer spotlight series, developing our weekly newsletters, as well as helping with social media promotions and other communications. She had the pleasure of speaking with some of our members to learn about art being created around the province.

Jody McCleary approached ArtsLink NB through the Future Ready NB program to develop a summer semester project that aligned with our arts education program. Combining art history with information on living, working New Brunswick artists, she has built a system that will be a tool for educators. Educators are given background and history about the artist, and are then taken through a step-by-step hands-on lesson with that artist as inspiration. Jody is entering the third year of her Bachelor of Applied Arts at NBCCD in the fall, following two years at UNB. Her goal is to return to UNB to complete a Master's in education.

ArtsLink developed the position of Communications Manager this year and hired Teagan Keith in October 2018. Teagan is a graduate from Humber College's Theatre Production program, and she has become very vital to the Saint John theatre community. This year, Teagan was the Stage Manager for SJTC's production of Little Shop of Horrors at the Imperial Theatre, as well and numerous Fundy Fringe shows.

Kenzie Hancox, our Arts Education Project Coordinator, has deftly delivered our education projects over the last year. Through the One-Job Pledge Program, we brought our three-time summer student back to finalize and publish our research as well as manage projects resulting from its recommendations. Kenzie has now transitioned into the position of program coordinator, managing all of our professional development programs. Kenzie is a Mount Allison graduate in Modern Languages and a fierce supporter of the arts.

We were very excited this year to welcome Mark Burnett to the team to plan the Arts Atlantic Symposium, a multi-day conference to be held in Oct. 2020. Mark is a professional marketer and event producer. ArtsLink is happy to support his enthusiasm and vision as he crafts Atlantic Canada's largest art symposium to date. ArtsLink NB would like to recognize the amazing work of our dynamic accelerator coordinator, Sarah Jones, who has devoted the past few years to establishing ArtsLink's flagship program, the CATAPULT Arts Accelerator.

Now that CATAPULT has matured and is recognized as an essential and prominent program in the arts ecosystem, Sarah is re-dedicating herself to her professional art practice — the amazing new iteration of the Jones Gallery and its innovative and burgeoning services. Sarah's fierce entrepreneurial spirit will be missed around the office but she will continue to sit on ArtsLink's events committee which oversees the planning of our 2020 Arts Atlantic Symposium.

Jericho Knopp has taken up the reins of CATAPULT. Jeri is a journalist turned program coordinator based out of Saint John. She's worked in business, fundraising and teaching, and her work has appeared in the CBC, *Huffington Post*, the *Telegraph Journal*, and *Visual Arts News*. We are delighted that she wil share her writing and communications experience with the ArtsLink team.



Since 2014, ArtsLink NB has gone from 1 full-time staff position to 3 full-time salaried positions, 2 full-time contract positions, 2-3 regular seasonal interns.


PROGRAMS

One of ArtsLink NB's key activities is the development and facilitation of a variety of professional development and research projects. In order to address elements of its mandate, ArtsLink organizes themed conferences and skills training, and engages in extensive member consultation. We also participate in educational activities presented by other organizations that help advance the public's understanding of and appreciation for the arts. All of these activities help New Brunswick artists develop their careers, build audiences, and create access to new markets for their work.

This year's programming included a panel discussion on Atlantic Vernacular at our 2018 AGM, the Start to Finish Workshop Series, the Short & Sweet Speaker Series, and the CATAPULT Arts Accelerator. In addition to our regular programs, we developed several new programs, including an Arts Writing Intensive led by editorial staff from *Canadian Art Magazine*, and a Cross-Cultural Creation Residency, in collaboration with Mawi'art and AAAPNB. We also continued our new work in Arts Education in the Anglophone school districts by publishing our research report, *Creating a Common Vision*, followed by a series of pilot programs to increase awareness and access to beneficial art programming for students.

Many of our activities focus on giving artists the tools and training they need to succeed in New Brunswick and beyond, as well as creating opportunities for artists to meet with each other and other stakeholders.

Another crucial role is championing greater support for the arts with government and the private sector. Our message: the arts aren't just a nice idea, but a vital and fruitful investment in the prosperity of our province.





START TO FINISH WORKSHOPS

ArtsLinkNB's 2018-19 Start to Finish workshop series focused on taking artists through all of the steps needed to access professional opportunities and succeed in their careers. The aim was to increase the number of artists pursuing grants and residency opportunities, as well as heighten their ability to succeed in their applications.

The year's workshops were intended to build upon each other, preparing participants who attended all three to pursue new artistic opportunities.

Topics included Crafting Your CV, Residencies and Opportunities, and Marketing and Audience Development. Workshops took place in Sackville, Saint John, Fredericton, Florenceville-Bristol, Moncton, and Bathurst.

In addition to these workshops, ArtsLink developed a handbook for members with tips and tricks on the topics discussed. Members can find this handbook online, in our office, and at their local arts centre. 2019-20 will see a continuation of these professional development sessions starting in the fall.

On October 12 and 13, 2018, ArtsLink NB offered a two-day Arts Writing Intensive in Saint John, led by *Canadian Art Magazine* editorial staff, Merray Gerges and Yaniya Lee. 13 emerging arts writers from throughout New Brunswick attended this inaugural session.

By cultivating expertise, exposure, and experience in a professional workshop, ArtsLink has helped increased the number of contributors writing about the arts in New Brunswick.

Participants now have essential skills to access a wider writing market, and we have fostered their confidence and knowledge of local, national, and international publications and web platforms where they can then pitch their writing. The long term objective is to see a large uptake in arts publications covering New Brunswick art, and paid work for NB arts writers, elevating the national profile of New Brunswick art and the work of New Brunswick-based arts publications and the level of arts writing circulating in New Brunswick

The facilitators encouraged each participant to send their pitches to publications, including their own, and they offered additional editing assistance after the workshop was finished.

ArtsLink is thrilled with the outcome of this session. The Arts Writing Intensive workshop will be integrated into our regular programming.

CROSS-CULTURAL CREATION RESIDENCY

The Cross-Cultural Creation Residency, held in 2019, provided the opportunity for creative pollination between artists of diverse cultural backgrounds. During this residency, an Anglophone artist, an Indigenous artist, and an Acadian artist spent three weeks working on creation projects in three different communities in New Brunswick. The program provided a dynamic collaborative studio setting with a strong focus on community engagement. In recognition of current dialogue and debate surrounding cultural and language tensions in New Brunswick, this initiative focuses on growth by combining diverse strengths rather than advocating for division.

The residency was attended by artists Indigo Poirier (Fredericton), Tara Francis (Elsipogtog), and Nicole Haché (Caraquet) from 15 March to 15 April, and featured artist talks and open studio days. The residency involved one week in each of the following communities: Metepenagiag First Nation, Caraquet, and Saint John.

Indigo Poirier is a Fredericton-based artist specializing in the medium of electronic music. Her solo work under the name Wangled Teb combines intricate drum programming and sound design with a strong sense of melodic progression and passion for experimentation with structure.

Tara Francis is a Mi'kmaq Artist from Elsipogtog First Nation. She attended the New Brunswick College of Craft and Design and has been working in her field since 2003. She specializes in porcupine quillwork, silk painting, and acrylic painting. She considers her work her spiritual journey and incorporates her teachings into each piece.

Nicole Haché grew up on Lamèque Island before moving to Caraquet. She uses her medical laboratory training to conceptualize her creations that address social habits and focus on human relationships and the planet. Her work offers a vibrant and delicate universe in counterpoint to the fury of modernity.

Through this residency, the artists had the opportunity to create new work while immersing themselves in the artistic processes of fellow artists. The experience of being in another community and creating with people of different artistic backgrounds allowed them to go beyond language barriers and discover different cultural environments.

This is also the inaugural collaboration between the three provincial artists service organizations: l'Association Acadienne des Artistes Professionnel.le.s du Nouveau-Brunswick, ArtsLink NB, and Mawi'art: The Wabanaki Artist Collective.

In the fall of 2019, we will launch a touring exhibition of work by the artists who participated in the residency. The exhibition will travel to Saint John, Metepenagiag, Moncton, and Caraquet and is curated by Emma Hassencahl-Perley, Erin Goodine, and Emilie Grace Lavoie.





CATAPULT ARTS ACCELERATOR

ArtsLink received a total of 30 applications to CATAPULT in response to our call for applications for the Fredericton program (Cohort 1: September to November 2018) and the Saint John program (Cohort 2 : March to May 2019). The calibre of applications was strikingly high; we had enough high-potential and well-argued proposals for the Saint John session that we could have easily formed a third cohort. Many of our participants had exceptionally strong artist CVs and have had numerous professional successes.

Many of our participants work part-time or full-time in arts administration and expressed a desire to transition into a more financially sustainable art practice/business.

We anticipated having six artists for each cohort. We selected seven artists for Cohort 1 and seven artists for Cohort 2. In each eight-week session, participants received one and a half days of training per week and took part in a final reception/pitch day.

Guest speakers for the 2018-19 CATAPULT programming were drawn from the New Brunswick entrepreneurial and business education communities. We structured the programming so that participants would receive hands-on training and strong theoretical knowledge of business concepts such as business planning, marketing, and bookkeeping. We also included professional artists in our guest speaker programming; artists who are currently working full-time in their practice who could give practical advice on day-to-day art business operations and also speak to the special needs of arts entrepreneurs.

The CATAPULT programming included two pitch day events. Cohort 1's pitch day was held in November 2018 at the Beaverbrook Art Gallery in Fredericton. There were 50 people in attendance. Cohort 2's pitch day was held in May 2019 at the New Brunswick Museum, in Saint John, with an attendance of 40. CATAPULT participants briefly presented their art and business practices to government representatives, business leaders, and members of the arts community. We envisioned and executed an inclusive business and arts event where members of each community could network and build relationships.

CATAPULT facilitated 9 of our business tips for artists worshops around the province in 2018-19, free for members.

AGM 2018: ST. ANDREWS

ArtsLink NB hosted its annual general meeting on October 14, 2018, at the Huntsman Marine Science Centre in St. Andrews. The AGM was followed by a panel discussion asking, "What is the Atlantic Vernacular? What are the materials and motifs defining artists of this region?"

ArtsLink NB is embarking on a multi-day symposium in the fall of 2020 based on the initial discussions around regional identity in the arts generated by our members at the 2018 AGM.

Multidisciplinary panelists included Connection Dance Works' artistic director Sarah Johnson Power, visual artist and storyteller Jerry Ropson, educator and visual artist Charlie Gaffney, and poet and fiction writer, Shoshanna Wingate.

ARTS EDUCATION


ArtsLink NB began a multi-phase arts education initative in 2017. We assembled a steering committee of sector stakeholders, hosted two series of public consultations called "Speaking Up on Arts Education", commissioned a research report, trained artists in classroom management, and funded a pilot project of field trips to performing arts facilities. ArtLink now has an ongoing public relations campaign promoting access to arts education through a holistic and integrative approach to learning and literacy.

Following the success of the town hall sessions held across the province that dentified the current issues in arts education in the Anglophone sector, the Arts Education Project launched into its second phase this year with the publication of *Creating a Common Vision: Issues and recommendations for K-12 Arts Education in New Brunswick.* This report outlines the improvements necessary for New Brunswick's arts-based learning to address the needs of its students and educators. It is a resource for the entire sector. Organizations and schools alike will be able to use this resource to create new programming, promote the arts, and assist learning. It will also link the production of local arts to pride of place and population retention. Structured by its twelve recommendations, this report was the base for the third phase of the arts education project, implementing initiatives such as a standing committee, classroom enhancement, career opportunity field trips, and learning through the arts toolkits that improve arts-based curricula.

With support from the Department of Tourism, Heritage, and Culture, and in collaboration with Education and Early Childhood Development, these initiatives are now underway. Notably, the conceptualized toolkits for arts educators, designed and created by Jody McLeary through the Future Ready NB program, are now in use. These toolkits are comprehensive guides for teaching foundations in fine arts as well as art history in a modern context for students today.

A media campaign is in production to share the relevance of the work done for the project and feature local arts educators who have first-hand experience with the benefits of arts education. This campaign will stream across ArtsLink NB's social media in the fall of 2019.





ADVOCACY

Advocacy is of critical importance to ArtsLink and its members. We work hard to ensure policy-makers understand the economic and social contribution of artists, as well as the challenges they face living and working in New Brunswick.

We worked with l'Association acadienne des artistes professionnel. le.s du Nouveau Brunswick (AAAPNB) this year to seek funding that would ensure the province could carry out the ambitions of the cultural policy - Creative Futures - put forward in 2014. The aims of the policy are ambitious and integral to the success of our sector, and we hope to see an increase in funding to artsnb (which is the best body to directly support artists' ability to execute their work), and more support for community arts organizations and institutions. Part of this effort involved meeting with each political caucus to discuss the needs of the New Brunswick arts sector on ArtsDay 2017.

In the fall of 2018, we launched our "I Vote NB Arts" campaign to inform our members of the major parties arts platforms, how to hold their own candidates forum on arts and culture and how to help develop discussion points surrounding issues and aspects of New Brunswick's cultural ecosystem. ArtsLink recognizes the importance of keeping the arts in the conversation leading up to elections and will continue to develop and disseminate information prior to every election.

GOVERNMENT WORKING GROUPS

ArtsLink NB promotes the growth and development of the New Brunswick arts sector through information, education, and member services, and by representing the membership in provincial, regional and national government, business and cultural forums and initiatives. ArtsLink NB has been extremely active in the past few years in a number of highlevel discussions and working groups that aim to improve the working and living conditions of New Brunswick artists.

These include:

- The Premier's Task Force on the Status of the Artist: ArtsLink's Executive Director and President were appointed to the Premier's Task Force on the Status of the Artist.
- Media Advisory Committee: ArtsLink NB represents the interests of filmmakers (from emerging to established).
- Maine/N.B. MOU Task Force: ArtsLink's Executive Director is a member of this important trans-border initiative.
- Cultural Policy: ArtsLink NB sits on the cultural policy implementation committee. This body oversees the progress of the 2014-2019 Cultural Policy, Creative Futures.
- PALC and Créons la suite policy alignment committee (language and cultural development policy for the francophone educational sector).
- Arts Working Group: artsnb has initiated a new working group of arts organizations consisting of artsnb, AAAPNB, and ArtsLink NB. The three organizations work together to ensure we are serving our shared constituents (professional artists), and to discuss programming and shared priorities.

NEW INITIATIVES

ArtsLink NB is developing a number of new initiatives for the 2019-20 operational year. Here is a brief overview of what is on the horizon.

ARTS ATLANTIC SYMPOSIUM

In the fall of 2020, ArtsLink NB will present a multi-day symposium celebrating and examining the tenacity and creativity of Atlantic artists, and the unique challenges of making a life in the arts in the Atlantic Region.

This event aims to dispel myths and present programming that investigates the past, present, and future of art developed in the Atlantic provinces. This symposium will feature initiatives that build connections among artists of all disciplines, develop new audiences, and will revel in the perspective of the Atlantic region's artistic point of view.

Join us October 14-18, 2020 in Saint John, New Brunswick!

ARTS AND CULTURE LABOUR FORCE

This year, ArtsLink NB has commisioned David Campbell to update our 2013 report: *Sustaining New Brunswick's Arts And Culture Workforce*. We recognize the changing landscape of New Brunswick and with more recent census data and other new research available, this is an excellent time to survey the cultural workforce and examine changes, new challenges, and other areas of potential growth.

GLOBAL STATEGY RENEWED


We will revisit ArtsLink NB's first major project, the translation of the *Global Strategy* developed by the AAAPNB. ArtsLink has happily undertaken the delivery of the English version of their renewal document *Trajectoire 18-23*. This project will enable Francophone and Anglophone artists to discuss New Brunswick's arts and culture issues on a level playing field. As well, the English document, will provide important background information to a broad spectrum of stakeholders, including elected officials.

ONLINE SKILLS WORKSHOPS

In partnership with Craft NB, ArtsLink NB is developing an online learning management platform to house and disseminate webinars, modules, and resources to help build successful arts careers. This project recognizes the isolation artists in NB feel when trying to access professional learning opportunities, and we aim to open this platform up to a variety of initiatives and partners in the cultural sector.

INTER: FUSE, LACE, RELATE

Thanks to support from the Sheila Hugh MacKay Foundation, ArtsLink has been able to hire the 3E collective (Emma Hassenchal, Erin Goodine, and Emilie Grace Lavoie) to curate a touring exhibition of the 2019 Cross-Cultural Creation Residency artists (Indigo Poirier, Tara Francis, and Nicole Hache). This exhibition begins Sept. 6, 2019 in Saint John, and will tour to several venues across the province.
